## Wynne's to-do list will be lengthy

**TORONTO** — Ontario's incoming premier Kathleen Wynne wants to end the "rancour and viciousness" that stalled the minority Liberal government under Dalton McGuinty.

In her first news conference since winning the party leadership, the Don Valley West MPP trotted out a long to-do list before the legislature resumes work on Feb. 19.

No date was set for assuming control of the government — a step that must wait until she has a slate of cabinet ministers ready to appoint.

"The logistics of swearing-in and making sure we have the pieces in place will take time," Wynne cautioned on Sunday as all but one of her five leadership rivals watched from the sidelines of the room.

Sandra Pupatello, who placed second in Saturday's convention at Maple Leaf Gardens, was at a family brunch.

It's expected that McGuinty will officially inform Lt.-Gov. David Onley of Wynne's victory today, at which time she will be commissioned to form a government and become known as the premier-designate.

Wynne, a former mediator, said she's arranging sit-down meetings with opposition party leaders Tim Hudak of the Progressive Conservatives and the NDP's Andrea Horwath to build bridges for finding "common ground."

She mentioned welfare reform and public-sector wage restraint among her top priorities, along with preparing a throne speech and a March budget that would require some opposition support to avoid an election.

## Remains discovered behind apartment building in Kitchener belong to Caucasian female, police say

**KITCHENER** — A widespread investigation is underway to identify the dismembered remains of a woman found in a garbage bin behind an apartment building near the city's downtown core.

Waterloo Regional Police were called to a highrise apartment building at 250 Frederick St. shortly after 11 a.m. Saturday after citizens discovered a human torso. As of Sunday, police said only the torso had been found.

Insp. Kevin Thaler, spokes-

person for the regional police, said that investigators are focused on identifying the victim.

"At this point our investigators are working on previous missing persons cases as well from our jurisdictions and other jurisdictions," Thaler said.

"We are asking the public, anyone, if they know this person to please contact police."

A preliminary examination of the body revealed that the torso is of a Caucasian female, however no further information on the age or identity has been determined.

The torso was clothed in a

black, short-sleeved T-shirt with a logo in front that read, "Forget princess, I want to be a vampire."

The building stands at the corner of Frederick Street and Gordon Avenue, one block north of Lancaster Street East.

The building's garbage bins are kept in an outdoor alcove clearly visible from the Gordon Avenue driveway that leads to both outdoor and underground parking.

The rear of the building remains cordoned off by investigating police.

## Parents drop children four storeys during fire

**WATERLOO** — A 19-month-old girl remains in hospital in critical condition after fire swept through a low-rise apartment complex on Saturday night.

As smoke and flames filled the building at 57 Bridgeport Rd. E., a family dropped their

two young children from a fourth-floor window in an effort to save them.

Firefighters rescued the two parents using ground ladders once they were at the scene. All four were taken to hospital, but the two adults and a four-year-old girl had been released by Sunday evening.

The toddler was transferred to the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto with critical injuries that officials believe resulted from the four-storey fall. One firefighter was taken to hospital as well with a severe cut to his arm. He has since been released.

## Messy weather mix moves in, starting with freezing rain

### #8 Camera magic

The eight-megapixel camera on the BlackBerry 10 smartphone enables you to go back and forth in time to deal with problems such as closed eyes and awkward poses.

You simply touch the screen while in camera mode to shoot the picture. If a person's eyes are closed, you touch the face on the image. The face is enlarged in a round popup window with a button on the perimeter. You move the button in a circular motion clockwise or counterclockwise to choose the best image.

The technique can be used on multiple faces.

Earlier or later versions of the entire picture can also be chosen by sliding a button along a bar at the bottom of the photo.

A camera icon is always available on the home screen for quick and easy access. The camera also shoots video in HD.

# Neighbours shocked by discovery

A search of the area and door-to-door canvassing of residents of both the building and neighbouring houses was conducted.

Watching the scene unfold Saturday afternoon, nearby residents were shocked by the news of a possible body found.

"That's shocking ... a little disturbed," said Darcie Laur, a resident of Gordon Avenue, just metres away from the scene.

"I've got two kids, I've never had any worries," Laur said of her eight years living in the area. "It's beautifully quiet, especially being so close to downtown."

Chris Rudorfer, 19, who has lived in 250 Frederick St. for five months, also said he feels safe in the area.

"It's mostly families (in the area) and a lot of elderly people in this building," he said.

Discussing the scene, Lynn Lindsay who lives in a low-rise apartment next to where the body was found, said she often sees people rummaging through the garbage bins and wasn't surprised by the location of the discovery.

"There's a lot of homeless (people) that go through those dumpsters all the time," Lindsay said.

Thaler said he could not confirm if the citizens who found the remains lived in 250 Frederick St. but did not believe they were from that building.

Even the connection between the victim and the area remains unclear.

"At this point the only connection we have was that the body part was found in the bins on the property," Thaler said.

How long the body part was there has yet to be determined.

The remains were transported to a hospital in Hamilton for a forensic autopsy that will be conducted today.

The bin was removed on a flat-bed truck Saturday at about 6:20 p.m. by police.

The incident marks the first homicide in the region for 2013.

A number of grisly cases involving the discovery of torsos and body parts made headlines in Canada last year.

Accused killer Luka Rocco Magnotta was arrested in a Berlin internet café in June after body parts belonging to Montreal university student Jun Lin were mailed to locations in Ottawa and British Columbia.

Remains belonging to Scarborough spa owner and mother of three Guang Hua Liu were discovered last summer in Lake Ontario and in two other waterways in the Toronto area. The victim's estranged boyfriend was charged with second-degree murder.

A torso found in the Niagara River in August belonged to a 30-year-old Niagara Falls, N.Y., woman reported missing days earlier.

Waterloo Regional Police are asking anyone who finds suspicious articles near their property to call 519-653-7700.

# Deadlock in case of psychiatrist molestation

CALGARY — The jury in the trial of a Calgary psychiatrist over sex assault charges appears to have reached an impasse.

After three days of deliberations the jury sent a note to Justice Donna Shelley.

It said despite vigorous and lengthy deliberation they are unable to reach a verdict on any of the nine charges against Dr. Aubrey Levin.

Levin, 74, is accused of molesting nine male patients who were ordered to see him by the courts.

The allegations came out in 2010 after one individual secretly videotaped an examination in which Levin appeared to fondle him.

Justice Shelley said she favours having the jury retire for the night and try again Monday.
